Beloved son of Very Rev. Fr. Taras & Pani Matka Laura Naumenko, brother to Alexis Naumenko, and grandson to Sasha & Natalia Pylypenko and the late Borys & Maria Naumenko. Julian was born November 21, 2005 in Palos Heights, Illinois.

As Julian grew, quickly emerged his mop of thick blond hair, suave dance moves, and his sweet, albeit mischievous, nature. Julian has always been curious about the world around him, his parents fostered this curiosity through exposure to as much travel as possible. Julian saw the world, and through his experiences developed a desire to work towards its greater good. He is forever remembered as having equal parts strength and compassion, determination and sensitivity, intelligence and humor.

From the time he could hold a candle, Julian diligently performed his duties as an altar server in the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA alongside his father Very Rev. Fr. Taras Naumenko. He participated in the church's youth organization the Jr. Ukrainian Orthodox League and attended the All Saints Camp in Emlenton, PA. Julian's faith guided him through many trials, and provided him a strong core to move confidently through the world.

Though Julian enjoyed many hobbies such as fishing at his favorite spot in the Florida Keys, snowboarding, playing with his dogs Archie & Luna and amateur automotive painting nothing compared to his love of soccer. Once the family relocated to Hatboro, PA Julian began playing for his beloved Philadelphia Ukrainian Nationals Soccer Club. Through his ten years with the organization, Julian fostered friendships, proudly supported his Ukrainian heritage, and developed his skills as a goalkeeper and leader within his peer group.

Attending Archbishop Wood High School, Julian earned his place as a soccer letterman and served as team Captain in his Junior and Senior seasons. Julian was consistently identified by teammates and friends as an exemplary leader, someone who led with passion and motivated his team towards excellence. His leadership on the field earned him, twice, a spot on the All-Philadelphia Catholic League Team and he received recognition on the All-Rookie Team. Julian is remembered by coaches and peers as a skilled athlete, as well as a kind and respected captain.

Julian continued his soccer and academic careers as a Freshman at Rutgers University-Camden. Julian began his college career as a goalkeeper for the Scarlet Raptors' Soccer Team. Coach Oswald, who recruited Julian, described him as, "Athletic. Big frame. Fantastic shot stopper. Quality distribution. An absolute presence in the box. He has a great work ethic and desire to push himself to the limit." He leaned into his sense of camaraderie, living with friends from the team.

Julian's charisma and intellect could have helped him succeed in any profession. He was well spoken, confident, and had the ability to look at situations from many points of view. Julian was, however, adamant he wanted to pursue a career continuing to serve his community and chose to major in Nursing.

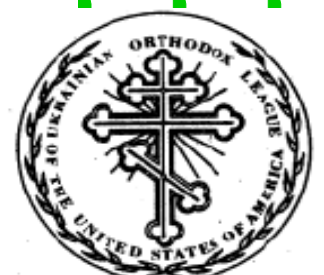

MESSAGE FROM THE SENIOR UOL

Glory to Jesus Christ! Glory forever!

Dear Reverend Clergy, and UOL friends and family,

I pray this address finds you well. I would be remiss if I didn't acknowledge that we have been through a lot lately. On a positive note, we celebrated the Nativity and the Baptism of our Lord. We also planned and executed our Souper Bowl Sunday Fundraisers for St. Andrew Society. But we've also seen many losses. Shortly after Nativity, we were faced with the sudden death of one of our own, Julian Naumenko. Julian is the son of Protopriest Taras Naumenko and Matushka Laura, the brother of Alexis Naumenko. For the Naumenko family, a family that has been very involved in the life and success of the UOL, this is an unimaginable loss. This is also a great loss for our Philadelphia and Palos Park parishes/chapters (two parishes that Fr. Taras served and that watched Julian grow up). A great fraction of our UOL family is left feeling disoriented...devastated...numb. No words are sufficient when we're faced with a tragedy like this. I pray, and ask you as well, to remember Julian and his family. May his memory be eternal!

This loss was difficult for me because Fr. Taras and Matushka Laura are my Kумы (Godparents to my Sebastian). I'm also a parent and no parent should feel the loss of their child. If that hit wasn't hard enough, I lost my dear father a few days later. There was a lot of grief that was placed in my care all in a short amount of time. Thankfully, I was comforted by the outpouring of sympathy from my extended family, friends, and many UOL members. Never more have I realized the importance of the UOL, than in this time of grief. The UOL has created a compassionate community of Orthodox faithful. This community is like no other. There are young and old and those in between. All of which serve in the Lord's vineyard through their love for each other. From the bottom of my heart, I thank you for being you! Thank you for your cards and phone calls. Thank you for attending my father's funeral and burial. Thank you for caring. Thank you for showing up.

When contemplating what words to share at my Tato's wake, I kept on being reminded of his level of dedication. He was dedicated to his family, to his work, and to his church. His life wasn't always easy but he always showed up. Showing up, as he would say, was the right thing to do. It didn't matter if it was inconvenient or even uncomfortable. I remember him driving out for Metropolitan Constantine's Consecration anniversary. It was 8 hours there and back. And then we were doing it again the following week, for Metropolitan's funeral. He always showed up.

Showing up is a choice. And it is a choice that many UOL members have made for the greater good of the UOL and our holy Ukrainian Orthodox Church. Showing up for a person demonstrates reliability. Showing up for an event shows commitment. It strengthens connections with people because it signals that you care. Showing you care is a message that not only has an impact when it is given but it lingers long after. It leaves a long lasting effect. The number one reason why the UOL is a strong community that has accomplished great things is because of a simple choice made by the faithful: we show up.

Showing up, especially in challenging situations can inspire others to do the same. And that creates a ripple effect creating a collective sense of purpose.

So, as we continue our journey through Lent, and in memory of those before us who 'showed up,' make the right choice and come to the Lenten Retreats, request a Panachyda for Metropolitan John Theodorovich and ask for donations for our Metropolitan John Scholarship Fund in May, and come to our Annual Convention in July. Do it for yourself, or for your family or just because it's the right thing to do. I'm doing it for my church, my family, and for my Tato, a man who made the world a better place just by being in it.

I wish you a blessed Lenten Journey.

LSSK REMINDERS Submitted by Teresa Linck

It is never too early to start collecting items for your application, so here are some very important reminders:

1. A high school principal, teacher or guidance counselor should complete the form titled **Scholastic Advisor** and return it to the applicant in a sealed envelope with their name written across the seal.
2. An **Official** copy of the student's transcript must also be submitted.
3. The Junior Chapter Advisor should fill out the form titled **Junior UOL Chapter Advisor** and return it to the applicant in a sealed envelope with their name written across the seal.
4. The Spiritual Advisor should fill out the form titled **Spiritual Advisor** and return it to the applicant in a sealed envelope with their name written across the seal.
5. **A special note: none of the previously mentioned forms should be filled out by the applicant or a family member. A qualified substitute is acceptable.**
6. Forms are to be sent to the chairperson by registered mail (mail that can be tracked) or by using FEDEX or UPS.

Forms will be available on the web site April 1, 2025. All application packets must be submitted to the chairperson no later than May 31, 2025. Applications that arrive after that date will not be considered for a scholarship. If an application does arrive on the deadline date, but is not complete it will not be considered for a scholarship. So do not wait until the last minute.

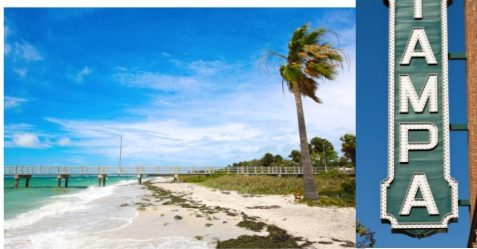

**Metropolitan John Scholarship Fundraiser

In 1964 the commission of Vocations and Clergy Support was organized by the UOL. The purpose of this commission is to provide encouragement and assist young men toward the successful goal of priesthood. As a part of this commission, the Metropolitan John Scholarship Fund (MJFS) was established in 1966 and the money goes to award scholarships and continuing education grants to seminarians and clergy of the church. His Eminence Metropolitan Antony was one of the first recipients! Additionally, in 1969 at the 22nd Annual Convention, it was resolved that the first Sunday after Ascension Day be established as "Clergy Appreciation Day." This day is held in honor of Metropolitan John to remember the many sacrifices and contributions he made during the early years of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA to make it what it is today.



This year the UOL is beginning a new fundraising effort to raise money for MJFS. We are asking that all parishes in the diocese consider holding a Panakhyda in Metropolitan John's memory on the first Sunday after Ascension as part of Clergy Appreciation Day. After the Panakhyda, we are suggesting hosting a coffee hour and taking up a free will donation/ collection to support the MJFS awards given out at our annual convention. This is our suggestion but do whatever works in your parish. Our clergy and seminarians are a vital part of our church community and are deserving of our support.

Our hope is that this will become an annual event in our parishes to raise money for MJFS. When you think of all the responsibilities of a priest, and how vital a good priest is to a parish, raising money to support them becomes just as vital. Category A: Pre-K and Kindergarten

Please draw a picture of the outside of your church.

Category B: Grades 1 and 2

As Orthodox Christians we are all baptized with the Grace of the Holy Spirit. Please draw a picture of the Baptismal Font in your church and write a sentence or two about something that happens when a person is baptized.

Category C: Grades 3 and 4

Please write 50 to 100 words on why it is a good idea to pray to your Guardian Angel.

Category D: Grades 5 and 6:

In 1 Peter 5:8, he writes “be watchful. Your adversary, the devil, prowls around like a roaring lion seeking someone to devour.” Please write 75 to 150 words telling us what this means to you and what you do to prevent being “devoured”?

Category E: Grades 7 and 8:

In the letters of James 3:6, he writes: “And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is an unrighteous world among our members, staining the whole body...” Please write 150 to 200 words on what you think James meant when he said these words especially what did he mean “stains the whole body”?

Category F: Grades 9 and 10

In his letter to the Philippians 2:3-4, Paul writes: “Do nothing from selfishness or conceit, but in humility count others better than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others.” Think about this passage and relate it to your life as a teenager. Please write 200 to 275 words on your thoughts.

Category G: Grades 11 and 12

In the letter of James 1:2-4, he says “Count it all joy, my brethren, when you meet various trials for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete lacking in nothing.” Please write 250 – 500 words on how these words of Paul will influence you as you move forward into a new chapter of your life, one of more independence in both actions, thoughts and decisions, which will impact the rest of your life.

Category H: Adults

In the letters of James 4:1-3, he says “What causes wars, and what causes fighting among you? Is it not your passions that are at war in your members? You desire and you do not have; so you kill. And you covet and cannot obtain; so you fight and wage war. You do not have, because you do not ask. You ask and do not receive because you ask wrongly...” Can these words be used to describe areas of our own lives and the current situation in the world today? Please write 500 words on your thoughts.
